Institutional Progress New Mexico DCs Learn Pharmacology

Where are we today and where are we going tomorrow? These are questions that are on the minds of educators here at National and most likely they pass through your minds as well as you care for

your patients from day to day.

We engage in regular long range and strategic planning, as you might expect, and this process keeps our institutional members and Board members up to date. However, even before things reach the planning stage, someone must be thinking far down the road, and to a large degree, that is my job, so what do I see?

Well, before I get there, let me tell you where we are now. We currently have a total of 911 students enrolled in National University programs, as follows:

Chiropractic Medicine (DC) – 538 in Lombard and 33 in Florida for a total of 571 (the percentage growth of our DC student numbers exceeds that of all other schools except one)

Naturopathic Medicine (ND) – 83

Acupuncture and Oriental Medicine (MSAc) and MSOM) – 44

Master of Science in Advanced Clinical Practice (MSACP) – 32

Family Practice Residency – 4

Diagnostic Imaging Residency (MSDI) – 2

Research Residency – 1

Baccalaureate – 70

In response to the passing of new regulations allowing New Mexico chiropractic physicians with the proper licensure and training to prescribe drugs from a limited formulary, the New Mexico Chiropractic Association asked NUHS if it would be willing to offer postgraduate coursework in pharmacology in the state.

New Mexico chiropractic physicians wanting to practice under the expanded scope of care may take a 90-hour program in pharmacology conducted by Daniel Richardson, assistant dean at NUHS, who holds a PhD in pharmacology and pharmocognosy from Loyola University, Stritch School of Medicine. "At the end of each module, the physicians must pass an examination. At the conclusion of the course, they must pass a comprehensive examination given by the state association in order to be eligible to apply for a license and a DEA number."

The physicians in the New Mexico program

also receive training in injectable nutrients and drugs from Michael Taylor, DC, who also holds a diplomate from the American Board of Chiropractic Internists.

"Chiropractic physicians are already licensed as primary care doctors in most states," says President Winterstein. "As health care policy-makers wrestle with the scarcity of general practice physicians, expanding the scope of chiropractic care to qualified chiropractic physicians makes good economic and strategic sense."

National students already receive the 90 hours of pharmacology (in addition to their prerequisite physiology and biochemistry courses) required for chiropractic physicians to earn a license to prescribe from a limited formulary of drugs in states passing such legislation. NUHS' Master of Science Degree in Advanced Clinical Practice also incorporates the 90 hours of advanced pharmacology coursework as part of its degree requirements.

NUHS Graduates 61 at Fall Ceremony

At the College of Professional Studies and College of Allied Health Sciences commencement ceremonies on August 19, a total of 61 graduates earned degrees or certificates.

The College of Professional Studies awarded 29 doctorate degrees in chiropractic medicine and three in naturopathic medicine, four master's degrees in acupuncture, and three master's in oriental medicine. The Lincoln College of Postprofessional, Graduate and Continuing Education also conferred one master's degree in diagnostic imaging.

The College of Allied Health Sciences conferred 15 students with their bachelor of science degree, one student with the associate of applied science in massage therapy, and five with the certificate in massage therapy.

Delivering the commencement address at the College of Professional Studies ceremony was the Honorable Jesse White, Illinois' three-term Secretary of State, who was presented with the honorary doctor of laws degree (LLD) following his speech.

Secretary of State White congratulated the graduates for their hard work "in professions that we hold in high esteem," many of which he has used himself.

White encouraged the graduates to be the best that they can be. "We want you to continue to put something between those ears and under that scalp that we call knowledge that will carry you far. We want you to do all you can to make your community a better place to live."

Our DC enrollment has increased an average of 12% each year over the past four years and the ND enrollment has increased 19% just this year alone.

I participate in each "Campus Visit Day" and as I talk to people, I ask them why they have chosen National. Most often, the reason stated is a simple, "National is the only school that requires the baccalaureate for entrance." This simple statement speaks volumes to me because it tells me that people appreciate institutions that have set the bar above the rest and it assures them that their education will likely be better as a result. I happen to believe they are right. I think our students with their average entering GPA of 3.2 and a baccalaureate make for better academic achievement, thus helping to ensure success here at National, and if my observations are any indication and our alumni surveys likewise, they are also successful in their practices — which is the ultimate goal.

Our Florida program is building slowly and carefully and we are blessed with an excellent student body and outstanding faculty, staff and administration. We just submitted our CCE Self Study for the Florida program and will receive information back from CCE in July 2011.

So, we are doing well here at your alma mater, but what of the future? Well, here is what I see. Whether it will all come true or not remains to be determined.

- **1.** We will most likely move into new facilities in Florida in the near future since St. Petersburg College is in the process of purchasing a new building about two blocks from where we are currently located and we have been invited to move into that building, which is an outstanding facility.
- **2.** We, for the past two years, with the Board's approbation, have been asking state boards whether, if we continue to offer the chiropractic medicine program as currently accredited by CCE, would the Board recognize the graduate's diploma if it used the designation "DCM" rather than "DC"? Most have said 'Yes, they would."

What is the point? Well, first it is grammatically incorrect to say "doctor of

chiropractic," which begs the question "chiropractic what?" The word "chiropractic" according to Oxford is an adjective, not a noun even though we have used it that way for a long time. Also, somewhere down the road, more and more states will begin to follow the initiative of New Mexico and will begin to offer limited prescriptive rights to the chiropractic physician. Our students right now receive 90 hours of pharmacology and 105 hours of botanical medicine — both naturopathic and chiropractic students — in preparation for the future.

3. We need to think in terms of residencies for all first professional doctoral students, naturopathic and chiropractic, and if acupuncture and oriental medicine move toward the doctoral level, for them as well. All other first professional primary care based doctoral programs require residencies. The problem that faces the chiropractic and naturopathic medicine professions is the lack of entre into residency programs. You will recall that National, in Fall 2009 began offering the Master of Science in Advanced Clinical Practice. Those people truly do get a rigorous program of advanced practice, which includes additional pharmacology, and much expanded physical medicine concepts, and advanced knowledge of evidence-based medicine.

It is my goal to use these graduates (those who have interest) as "residency directors" for DC graduates. This is a major undertaking but one well worth the effort, and Dr. Vincent DeBono, Vice President for Academic Services, is leading a Residency Committee with this end in mind. It will happen. Initially, our grads will have such an opportunity on a volunteer basis but as the program grows, it will eventually become mandatory.

- **4.** As a result of their expanded education, I believe our National grads will have far better opportunities to enter into integrated practices, the Department of Defense, the Veteran's Administration programs, and even hospitals, especially now that the Joint Commission, which accredits hospitals, has recognized chiropractic doctors as physicians.
- **5.** Finally, I am hopeful that the chiropractic profession will observe the naturopathic profession and take some clues about "modernizing" itself. We are entering a phase in health care delivery that will be all about "evidence-based medicine," and all the current research aside, if we wish to survive, we must demonstrate our ability as

primary care providers. To me, this is vital for our new graduates who need to pursue an avenue that is currently wide open but which the profession has largely ignored. I see signs from the American Chiropractic Association that this is changing and none too soon as far as I am concerned.

So there is a thumbnail sketch. If you have ideas and/or comments please drop me a line at jwinterstein@nuhs.edu, and try to remember that is primarily not about those successful doctors who have been in practice for the past 15 or 20 years, but about those who will follow you, and about all those patients who, up 'til now have not benefited from chiropractic, naturopathic or oriental medicine care — or to wrap it all up — natural medicine care.

Interns in the Doctor of Chiropractic Medicine Program performed medical examinations for prospective Chicago Blackhawks hockey players at the United Center in Chicago in August. Manuel Duarte, DC, faculty clinician, said they examined 71 new recruits performing vitals, EKGs, spirometry, urinalysis, and other lab work. The interns worked alongside professional athletic trainers who were conducting performance studies, as well as an MD and a cardiologist.
