# Kristine Aikenhead BS, DC



Dr. Kristine Aikenhead dedicated her entire 33-year career to Chiropractic and Naturopathic education at National University of Health Sciences. She graduated Cum Laude from National College of Chiropractic in 1983 and completed the Family Practice Residency at the same institution in 1985. During her residency, she became aware of her love of teaching and immediately upon its completion, began her teaching career at National. Between

1985 and 2024, she was a full-time faculty member for 20 total years and part time for 13 years. In her first year as an instructor, she was awarded the Faculty Development Award. She currently holds the rank of full Professor.

Dr. Aikenhead's contributions to the Chiropractic Profession include multiple opportunities of service on the test writing committee of the National Board of Chiropractic Examiners. In addition, her publications include two case studies published in the Journal of Chiropractic Medicine and one chapter in the textbook, Fundamentals of Chiropractic Diagnosis and Management, by Lawrence, published by Williams and Wilkins.

At National, she served as Chair of the Department of Clinical Sciences--Illinois from 2013-2015, and worked especially on communication and bridge-building between the Acupuncture and Herbal Medicine, Naturopathic and Chiropractic arenas, as well as cosmetic updates to the Manipulation Labs. Dr. Aikenhead also served a number of terms as Faculty Senate Chair, with special emphasis on collegiality between faculty and with administration.

For Dr. Aikenhead, serving as the faculty advisor for FOCUS, the Fellowship of Christian University Students, has been especially fulfilling. Through involvement with this club, she has had the opportunity to participate along with students in food and clothing drives, prayer for students and beloved faculty members, and even serving at Dr. Janse's Memorial Luncheon in 1986.

This month, Dr. Aikenhead retires from full-time instruction to begin another chapter.

#### INTEGRATIVE HEALTH PROFESSIONAL OATH

#### THE ACADEMIC REGALIA

The academic costume or regalia worn by the faculty and graduates in NUHS ceremonies originated in medieval Europe. The gown was originally an outer robe worn by scholars. The academic regalia can vary from institution to institution. In the United States, a more unified code began to be recognized in the late 1900's. This codified approach was meant to help identify what school or institution a scholar graduated from and their discipline of study.

Robes that graduates wear will signify their academic degree. The doctoral degree is unique in that it features velvet trim including three velvet chevrons on each sleeve. A master's degree is conveyed through black robes with long trailing sleeves. Bachelor's and certificate degrees both have traditional bell-shaped long sleeves.

The hood was once a real hood, but today's hoods are purely ornamental. All hoods have a black base and are lined with the school colors (National University of Health Sciences' are maroon and goldenrod), and are trimmed in the colors of the discipline in which the degree is being granted. Green is the color of medicine, and this is the most common color you will see at an NUHS graduation. Other colors you may notice are dark blue, indicating a degree in the sciences; light blue, for education; and lemon, for library science. The length of the hood itself is also indicative of the level of degree earned, with doctorate level hoods being longer than those of the master's degree hoods.

Non-tenured faculty and graduates wear four-sided mortar board caps as they are not informative as to the highest degree earned. However, those having earned the doctoral degree don a gold tassel atop the mortar board caps. As is tradition, members of our esteemed faculty that have achieved tenure at the University and members of the administration are afforded the opportunity to wear tams. I solemnly pledge before God and these witnesses to consecrate my life to the service of humanity;

will give to my teachers the respect and gratitude that is their due;

I will apply the art and science of my discipline with compassion, personal accountability, professionalism, and respect for the people I am privileged to serve;

The health of my patient will be my first consideration;

I will respect the secrets that are confided in me, even after the patient has died;

I will maintain by all means in my power, the honor, and the noble traditions of the healing professions;

My colleagues will be my sisters and brothers;

I will not permit considerations of age, gender, ethnicity, religion, disability, sexual orientation, education, identity, ideology or any other factor that imperils my duty to honor the doctor/patient relationship;

I will maintain the utmost respect for human life and always remember to "First, Do No Harm";

I will not use my medical knowledge contrary to the laws of humanity, even under threat;

I make these promises solemnly, freely, and upon my bonor.
