# The Honorable Representative Terra Costa Howard

42<sup>nd</sup> District

State Representative Terra Costa Howard is a lawyer, small business owner, wife, mother, and tireless advocate for children and people in need.

After earning a B.A. in political science and speech communications at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign in 1993 and a law

degree at DePaul University in 1996, Costa Howard started her legal career as a staff attorney at the DuPage County 18th Judicial Circuit Court. There she saw firsthand how tough it can be for everyday people to navigate the complexities of our court system.

After two years, Costa Howard joined the DuPage County Public Defender's Office, where she represented children and parents living in poverty. She proved herself to be a fierce and determined champion, standing up for vulnerable people and speaking out on behalf of her clients and their families.

In 2003, Costa Howard opened her own legal practice, where she continues to fight for the rights of children, elderly people, people with disabilities, and families caught in custody and visitation disputes.

As a member of the Illinois House since 2019, Costa Howard has been a strong voice for victims and survivors of trafficking. She led the passage of a new Illinois law that requires training for hotel and motel staff, to help them recognize and report suspected cases to the proper authorities. She also passed important new protections for Illinois survivors of domestic violence and stalking.

She has worked hard to provide new protections for Illinois seniors. She led the bipartisan passage of SB 69, which created tough new penalties for criminal abuse and neglect, identity theft, and financial exploitation of seniors and individuals with disabilities. She also passed HB 2643, which protects seniors who are pressured into signing contracts by unscrupulous door-to-door salespeople and home repair scammers.

Now in her fourth term in the General Assembly, Costa Howard represents the 42nd House District, which includes Lombard, Glen Ellyn, and parts of Wheaton, Downers Grove, Lisle, and Naperville. She serves as Chair of the House Human Services Committee and Vice Chair of the Adoption & Child Welfare Committee.

#### THE ACADEMIC REGALIA

The academic costume or regalia worn by the faculty and graduates in NUHS ceremonies originated in medieval Europe. The gown was originally an outer robe worn by scholars. The academic regalia can vary from institution to institution. In the United States, a more unified code began to be recognized in the late 1900's. This codified approach was meant to help identify what school or institution a scholar graduated from and their discipline of study.

Robes that graduates wear will signify their academic degree. The doctoral degree is unique in that it features velvet trim including three velvet chevrons on each sleeve. A master's degree is conveyed through black robes with long trailing sleeves. Bachelor's and certificate degrees both have traditional bell-shaped long sleeves.

The hood was once a real hood, but today's hoods are purely ornamental. All hoods have a black base and are lined with the school colors (National University of Health Sciences' are maroon and goldenrod), and are trimmed in the colors of the discipline in which the degree is being granted. Green is the color of medicine, and this is the most common color you will see at an NUHS graduation. Other colors you may notice are dark blue, indicating a degree in the sciences; light blue, for education; and lemon, for library science. The length of the hood itself is also indicative of the level of degree earned, with doctorate level hoods being longer than those of the master's degree hoods.

Non-tenured faculty and graduates wear four-sided mortar board caps as they are not informative as to the highest degree earned. However, those having earned the doctoral degree don a gold tassel atop the mortar board caps. As is tradition, members of our esteemed faculty that have achieved tenure at the University and members of the administration are afforded the opportunity to wear tams.
