#### MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT



his edition of the NUHS magazine highlights the culmination of many years of planning. I invite you to explore the continued improvements and campus construction in Illinois and a whole new location in Florida! A great deal of thanks goes out to the Board of Trustees for their dedication and hard work. Many of the projects highlighted in these pages started during COVID. If we think about how the world has changed us and around us since that time, you can begin to understand the focus that it took for the Board to navigate those changes while planning major transformations to both University locations.

National University has enjoyed tremendous success and growth during our historic partnership with a state-funded education institution in Florida. After several years of searching, and after the property became available, we began to engage with the City of Oldsmar. Immediately we were made to feel welcome and looked for ways in which our new community and the University could find meaningful ways to grow together.

As for the campus in Illinois, which the University moved to in the early 1960's, things are also changing. Over the past year or so, Janse Hall has seen major renovations. The main floor hallway has been transformed, an elevator was installed, and now we are working on the final phase of upgrades. The old physiology area and adjacent post-graduate offices are being reimagined into an overall student services area that will cater to the needs of our students. The façade of the new space will reflect the renovations applied to the campus store and the Eagle's Nest student lounge. The new area will also provide access to an outdoor patio and seating area. Without question, there are exciting things happening at National University of Health Sciences!

With that said, a university is nothing but for the success of its graduates. I'm thrilled to see many of the wonderful things our graduates are doing. Positively reshaping their professions and their communities seems to be a theme with National University grads. Over the past year, we have had many great graduation speakers. ## Prepares for Growth

n fall 2024, National University of Health Sciences (NUHS) announced it is expanding its presence in Florida. NUHS has operated its Doctor of Chiropractic program in Florida since 2009. The new facility, located in Oldsmar, Florida, will give the University more than 40,000 square feet of space in which to continue its 118+ years of excellence.

"The Board of Trustees of National University of Health Sciences is delighted that we are moving the Florida campus to Oldsmar," said Jane Richards, PhD, DC. Chair of the Board of Trustees. "We see it as a positive move for NUHS with a lot of benefits for our students and room for future growth."

"The move to a dedicated campus, still in Pinellas County, will give us breathing room to expand our Doctor of Chiropractic (DC) program," said Joseph P.D. Stiefel, MS, EdD, DC and President of National University of Health Sciences. "Oldsmar is a growing community that's retained its small-town charm. It is a community we are proud to join."

"Our students and faculty have always been community-centric, and our new home will certainly bring out the best in them. The city

of Oldsmar has been incredibly welcoming, and we look forward to this new and exciting chapter," President Stiefel said.

The new site in Oldsmar is approximately 30 minutes (18 miles) from the current site, and easily accessible via Florida State Road 580, as well as both of Tampa's two major airports, Tampa International Airport (TPA) and St. Petersburg-Clearwater International Airport (PIE).

"Oldsmar will provide the perfect community to partner and grow with," said Ron Mensching, **NUHS Vice President for Business** Services, who assisted in the acquisition and purchase process. "In addition, Oldsmar is known for its diverse population, thriving local economy and abundant recreational amenities. The community is home to picturesque waterfront parks, and a robust downtown district offering ample restaurants and shopping—there's so much to do there."

"We're projecting that our new home will comfortably accommodate our current and future faculty, staff and students," said Randy L. Swenson, MHPE, DC and Vice President for Academic Services at NUHS. "It's an exciting time for our University."

The first class at the new location is tentatively scheduled to begin in 2026. Initially, the Doctor of Chiropractic (DC) program will be offered at the new Florida site, with an eye toward future expansion of NUHS' additional health care programs.



Today, Oldsmar is a vibrant suburb of Tampa with a population of 14,877. Located in Pinellas County, it is recognized as one of the best places to live in Florida.

## **Student Success Center**



ational University of Health Sciences (NUHS) is in the process of consolidating its broad array of student services conveniently into one area on the main level of Janse Hall. The new Student Success Center is anticipated to open in the spring of 2025, where the offices of Financial Aid, Student Services, the Registrar and Student Accounts will soon be strategically located in relation to each other.

"The new office suite will offer much greater visibility and convenience," said Ron Mensching, **NUHS Vice President for Business** Services. "Our goal is to feature the most in-demand student services more prominently, so students as well as visitors will be exposed more easily to the wide range of services we offer."

The new office suite – a spacious 5,400-square-feet - will also feature a concierge/reception area

and, in close proximity, a studentdedicated copy station in addition to those currently offered in the James F. Winterstein Library.

The building project, due in part to a grant received from the Illinois Board of Higher Education, is part of the Long-range Plan for the University.

lighting and general updating in the main Janse hallway," said Mark Galvanoni. NUHS Director of Facilities and Security. "The next phase of improvements saw reconfiguration of some technique labs and classrooms, especially on the lower level, the addition of a dedicated sprinkler room to enhance our campus fire protection facilities and the addition of an elevator to improve building logistics - and most importantly to accommodate members of the campus community with special needs."

Janse Hall was the first building built on the Lombard campus in 1963. At that time, it featured three lecture halls, a gross anatomy laboratory, five additional labs, a library and a public clinic. Since that time, NUHS has expanded to nine buildings on 32 acres in suburban DuPage County.

"The impetus for building these refinements is due to several factors, including the trend in higher education to be more accommodating and supportive of student needs, and to be more visible and accessible in general," Mr. Mensching said.

More renovations are planned for the future, including expanding treatment rooms in the NUHS Whole Health Center, and student residence halls continue to receive scheduled, planned maintenance and updating as needs require.



n early 2024, National University of Health Sciences (NUHS) embarked on a comprehensive marketing campaign to update and better integrate print and digital recruitment materials.

"The new campaign was created to accomplish several key goals," said NUHS President, Joseph P.D. Stiefel, MS, EdD, DC. Our ultimate goals are to revitalize the University's image in the marketplace, refresh admission materials for strategic recruitment of prospective students, and to claim our position as the standard of excellence and a leader in health care education.

"We're taking an even more bold, clear stance on who we are," said Dr. Stiefel. While NUHS has successfully utilized Defining the Future of Integrated Health Care – and was the first to do so among health care institutions - much has happened in the world since that declaration. 

### **NUHS Celebrates** Fall 2024 Graduates



n December 13, National University of Health Sciences (NUHS) celebrated the hard work and accomplishments of its Fall 2024 graduating class. Sixty graduates received diplomas in chiropractic medicine, naturopathic medicine, acupuncture, Oriental medicine, advanced clinical practice and biomedical sciences.

Alumna Kristine Tohtz, DC, '01; DABCA; MSAc, '14; LAc; CACCP; Certified MDT, delivered the commencement keynote address. In her address, Dr. Tohtz encouraged graduates to build meaningful connections that will last a lifetime. "Smart hard work counts," she said. Other keys to success she shared were to show up on time, look people in the eye,

shake their hands, listen more than you speak, never stop learning, support your colleagues, give back, join your associations and surround yourself with people who will only lift you up. "Connections are why we are here," she concluded.

Dr. Tohtz teaches continuing education to health care practitioners of all types on the topics of acupuncture, dry





needling, pregnancy, nutrition and pediatric care and has earned a certification through the world-renowned Institute for Functional Medicine (IFM). She also is a practicing chiropractic physician and acupuncturist through the Veteran's Administration in Port St. Lucie. Fla.

Valedictorians of the bachelor of science in biomedical sciences, master of science in acupuncture, chiropractic medicine and naturopathic medicine programs shared their words, memories and insights.

Angel Ruiz, valedictorian for the Bachelor of Science in Biomedical Sciences program shared his father's advice when he urged his fellow graduates to remember, "Nothing nice comes easy to those who don't work hard," and to spend time with those who love you most.

Elizabeth Rivera-Melo, valedictorian for the Master of

Science in Acupuncture class spoke of uplifting life experiences, including why she decided to pursue acupuncture (it alleviated her own acute pain when nothing else could), and challenged her classmates to contemplate, "Whose lives are WE going to change?"

Carly Sidor, Doctor of
Chiropractic Medicine valedictorian
urged her classmates to remember
the "Why" when reflecting on why

as a profession. "The answer will
help you stay resilient," she said.

Paul Randel Grinter, Doctor of Naturopathic Medicine valedictorian prompted his fellow graduates to remember the 2 Cs of great science: curiosity and courage. "Curiosity has changed the world; it is your curiosity that brought you to National University. What makes you a doctor, no matter what comes, is that you

have the courage for whatever comes before you – and you will make a difference."

n spring 2024, NUHS alumna Cindy Howard, DC, DABCI, DACBN, '98, discussed a framework on how to get through life's biggest challenges during the podcast, Women and Small Business with Allison Marketti.

Dr. Howard who wrote, Positively Altered: Finding Happiness at the Bottom of a Chemo Bag, shared her own journey toward positivity after her self-diagnosis of Hodgkins Lymphoma in 2013.

For Dr. Howard, the cancer diagnosis was a wake-up call that forced her to take a hard look at her life and the choices she was making.

"In retrospect, I knew all the right things to do, it doesn't mean I did them or I didn't learn the right things until later," she said. "So, I think it's really important that we don't beat ourselves up. We have to learn to forgive ourselves."

Dr. Howard also discussed her journey to become an internist during her time at National University of Health Sciences. As a former athlete and dancer, she originally planned to become a sports chiropractor, but her education at NUHS helped her realize she could do much more. In an OB/GYN course, she met a former faculty member who would later become a close mentor.

"I learned that in chiropractic medicine...in a lot of states we're deemed primary care physicians and I thought, this is so cool, I can actually do this part of health [obstetrics and gynecology] as a physician not just treat sports injuries," she said. "So, graduating from NUHS, we get a very broad primary care education. The University does an amazing job."

Afterward, she earned a Diplomate in internal medicine and a Diplomate in nutrition. Even though her very first patient came in with back pain, Dr. Howard did more than simply adjust. She treated her internally by

running lab tests, identifying inflammatory markers and looking at the patient's nutrition. Twenty-five years later she has continued to treat patients in a similar manner. Today, Dr. Howard is a national speaker and operates Innovative Health & Wellness Center in Orland Park, Ill., which provides chiropractic medicine and acupuncture.

During the podcast, Dr.
Howard shared just how
much mindset matters when
it comes to physical health.
She also offers nutritional
information on what both
adults and children should
eat, as well as avoid.

Dr. Howard emphasized that no matter what someone is going through, everything is manageable. "You only are stuck if you want to be stuck," she said. "It's a choice."

## Navigating the Path:

#### Alumnus John A. Wascow, DC, CKTP, Inspires NUHS Students



n summer 2024, National University of Health Sciences (NUHS) alumnus, John A. Wascow, DC, '09, CKTP, shared his professional and personal experiences in a Student Success Session. His topic, Navigating the Path: My Journey Into the Profession and Tips for New Graduates, provided an inspirational platform and practical information for those about to enter the profession of chiropractic medicine.

"There are things I wish I knew about before I graduated," Dr. Wascow said. Here are the top five he recommends:

**#1: Ioin Togstmasters.** You must be able to speak well to make your practice's message understood.

**#2: Get a Mentor.** Being in school and working in a practice are two totally different situations:

Learn what to do and what not to do so you don't make any costly mistakes when it matters.

#3: Be. Different. Find your unique niche and market it! Become proficient in social media and brand yourself. You have one chance to make an impression.

#4: Consider buying a practice. There are more pros than cons when it comes to purchasing a practice. "For example, you start with an established client base, have immediate access to equipment and have the opportunity to create the lifestyle that you want faster," he said.

**#5:** Get credentialed as soon as you can. It takes three to six months to get credentialed with insurance. Don't let any waiting time hinder your success.

When it comes to adapting to life's changes, Dr. Wascow is no stranger to challenge and perseverance. While he initially worked as a computer consultant, he also competed in amateur motorcycle racing. Following a lifethreatening motorcycle accident in 2002 that resulted in multiple serious injuries, he had to relearn to walk and encountered numerous speech difficulties. His extensive recovery and rehabilitation sparked his interest in helping others suffering from pain and trauma. This passion led him to the field of

chiropractic medicine, and, during his recovery, he enrolled at NUHS-Lombard.

"As I watched the doctors and therapists help me put my life back together, I thought 'I want to do that. I want to give back," he said.

Dr. Wascow graduated with his Doctor of Chiropractic degree in 2009, and currently is the owner of JW Center for Spinal Health, Inc. in Northbrook, III. He mainly focuses on musculoskeletal issues and promoting general well-being through chiropractic care, rehab, Stecco Fascial Manipulation, acupuncture and nutrition. Additionally, he is a Certified Kinesio Taping Practitioner (CKTP) and is one of nine practicing Stecco Fascial Manipulation practitioners in the state. He recently authored a thought-provoking, inspirational book, Life After the Red Flag: Becoming a Doctor After Overcoming a Life-Threatening, Traumatic Brain Injury.

"I was given a second chance at life," Dr. Wascow said. "Now, my passion is to motivate and inspire others who have faced similar challenges."

#### **NUHS HEALTH FAIRS BENEFIT COMMUNITY,** STUDENT LEARNING EXPERIENCE





In March, July and November 2024, National University of Health Sciences' Whole Health Center-Lombard, hosted three successful health fairs during Community Appreciation Weeks. The events helped elevate local awareness and engagement, while enhancing the student learning experience for chiropractic, naturopathic and

Clinic events play an ongoing vital role in patient education, while helping interns understand the connection between patient health and education. More community health fairs are planned for 2025.

#### **2024 SCHOOL BACKPACK DRIVE SETS DONATION RECORDS**

In the summer, the annual Pinellas Park Medical District (PPMD) Back-to-School Backpack Drive assembled and donated a recordsetting 2,040 backpacks full of school supplies, 65 bicycles and an abundance of free food.

In addition to giving away more school supplies and backpacks than ever before, the event also gave away three-times more bicycles than any previous event. National University of Health Sciences

#### STUDENT VETERAN SHARES HER JOURNEY INTO **NATUROPATHIC MEDICINE & HOW NUHS COMMUNITY** HELPS HER THRIVE



During her career as a licensed massage therapist, Amber Misiowiec discovered a lot about alternative medicine, sparking an interest in herbal medicine, aromatherapy and the healing power of nature. It was this passion that ultimately led her to pursue the Doctor of Naturopathic Medicine (ND) program at National University of Health Science (NUHS).

Misiowiec, a U.S. Air Force veteran who's currently in her fifth trimester of the ND program, said the University's Yellow Ribbon program was a significant draw. Navigating the application process and ensuring tuition coverage can be daunting tasks for any prospective student. However, with the assistance of NUHS'

admissions staff, Misiowiec said she found the process to be smooth and seamless.

"I was pleasantly surprised on numerous occasions on the follow-through and promptness in all forms of communication," she said. "This is what sets the NUHS application process apart from other professional schools in my opinion. I felt supported, encouraged, and like I was a valued future professional asset to this University. This is rare and should not go unnoticed."

The NUHS Veterans Clinic, where interns provide hundreds of free and discounted treatments to veterans each year, also appealed to Misiowiec. As a veteran, her desire to give back to the military community and fellow service members is deeply

ingrained. Reflecting on her experience at NUHS, Misiowiec said the sense of community and camaraderie is similar to the bonds often formed among service members.

"The rigorous programs at NUHS demand resilience, drawing upon the experiences of navigating high-pressure situations while in service," she said. "Just as in the military, teamwork proves invaluable in managing these challenges. Throughout my first trimester, I found support not only from peers but also from professors and upperclassmen, highlighting the collective commitment to each other's success on campus."

Misiowiec, who is also a single mother, said the flexible track program, which allows students to complete coursework at a

slower, more individualized pace, helped her balance her schoolwork with home life. One of the other perks of campus life is that there are plenty of ways to get engaged and to connect. When she graduates, Misiowiec plans to establish her own clinic focused on herbal medicine and mental health. She also aspires to conduct research on the potential therapeutic benefits of psychedelics. To fellow veterans considering naturopathic medicine or attending NUHS, Misiowiec stresses the importance of connection, involvement and remaining focused on goals.

#### STUDENTS AND FACULTY **COMPLETE TRANSFORMATIVE** TRIP TO SOUTH KOREA



In 2024, NUHS students and faculty completed a trip to South Korea that allowed them to learn more about traditional Eastern medicine. The trip was part of the University's ongoing partnership with Pusan National University that began in 2019. Over the past several years, this collaboration facilitated a series of educational exchanges, including online and in-person lectures and certificate programs.

"During the trip, students got the chance to witness the latest developments, skills and technologies in traditional Eastern medicine in a way that's not possible here," said Dr. Hyundo Kim, Assistant Dean of the Acupuncture and Herbal Medicine Program, who accompanied students on the trip. "They gained skills and experiences that will benefit them throughout their careers."

Ten NUHS students participated in the trip, which included a diverse array of activities in Pusan for the first week, and Seoul for the latter half of the trip. They attended lectures at Pusan National University and Kyunghee University, visited Jaseng Hospital and its research facilities, explored herbal dispensaries and markets and experienced a Templestay at Tongdosa, a UNESCO World Heritage Site. A Templestay is a cultural program offered in numerous South Korean Buddhist temples. Additionally, students visited several private Korean medicine clinics.

The partnership between NUHS and Pusan National University continues to thrive. Dr. Kim is optimistic about future trips, noting that the University plans to send students to South Korea every two or three years, depending on demand. A trip to China is in the planning stages.

### THE GROWING FIELD OF ACUPUNCTURE: A 2024 SNAPSHOT

The increase of knowledge in acupuncture is generating advances in health care and sparking economic success. While the field of acupuncture is 3,000 years old, its use is on the rise today thanks in part to research further identifying new and relevant uses, thereby encouraging more patients to seek treatments, igniting industry growth and offering rewarding opportunities for professional advancement.

In the United States, data from the National Health Interview Survey shows the use of acupuncture by U.S. adults more than doubled between 2002 and 2022. In 2002, 1.0 percent, or 2,883,592 U.S. adults used acupuncture; in 2022, 2.2 percent, or 7,442,376 U.S. adults used it.

Healthcare Medicine Institute recently reported on top medical and academic institutions where exciting advancements in research and treatments are being made.

"NUHS acupuncture faculty are dedicated to evidence-based practice, and as such, incorporate the results of current research into their teaching," said Dr. Gregory Cramer, NUHS Dean of Research. "In addition, faculty are actively engaged in scholarship related to acupuncture, which heightens their

understanding of, and appreciation for the latest research findings."

The results of acupuncture scholarship and research help NUHS faculty and students remain leaders in acupuncture treatments. Often, the results of research are directly applicable to clinical practice, informing faculty and students of treatment protocols recently shown to be effective in patients, said Dr. Cramer.

"I often discuss cases in the classroom," said Hyundo Kim, PhD, MSOM, LAc and Assistant Dean of Acupuncture and Herbal Medicine at National University of Health Sciences (NUHS).

"I'm in the process of developing a new curriculum for the Doctor of Acupuncture, with specialization in Herbal Medicine program (DAc-HM), and I intend to incorporate a dedicated class for teaching research findings," Dr. Kim said. "This way, we'll ensure

our students are learning the most recent advancements in acupuncture and this will enhance their clinical performance."

NUHS' Zhanxiang Wang, PhD, MD (China), LAc concurs. "When we talk about specific conditions, I always introduce evidence-based practice research to the students," he said.

At the master's level, students are taught how to search and evaluate current research based on their own interests and/or clinic problems. At the doctoral level, students learn how to perform research on their own, as well as how to evaluate and use research from others.

As more patients actively seek out acupuncture treatments, the demand for practitioners is growing as a result. This increased demand has created attractive economic incentives for students to pursue careers in acupuncture.



The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reports that the median annual wage for acupuncturists is \$78,220, with a high of \$140,660.

According to CareerExplorer.com, in addition to higher earnings and job growth, acupuncturists rate their career happiness 3.7 out of 5 stars, which puts them in the top 20% of careers. This helps illustrate that career satisfaction and the desire to "make a difference" are strong incentives for career happiness in their own right.

## Faculty in the News

#### David Hopper, DC, OMT, **Instructor - Basic & Clinical Sciences**



As an NUHS student working with Gregory D. Cramer, DC, PhD, NUHS' Dean of Research,

Dr. Hopper first became involved in an independent study course for conservative treatment of sleep apnea. Today, as a researcher and inventor, he seeks to continue to deliver aid to his patients.

Dr. Hopper was among the first to research heart-rate variability (HRV). To effectively monitor HRV, he developed a mobile app and got to know many of the top researchers in the field, including Inna Khazan, PhD, BCB, a faculty member at Harvard Medical School. Today, his HRV mobile app is used in multiple health disciplines.

To date, Dr. Hopper has spoken to chiropractic associations across 20 different states and teaches a continuing education course for the Illinois Chiropractic Society, and other private continuing education programs. Currently, he sits on the board of the Association for Applied Psychophysiology and Biofeedback (AAPB) and speaks at their annual convention.

In response to his patients reporting they felt great after a visit, but needed help alleviating pain and discomfort between chiropractic visits, Dr. Hopper invented a solution. The device is called the

Mobility Master, because it helps chiropractors and patients keep the spine mobile between visits. The device can be adapted for specific areas of the spine where relief is needed, and pressure intensity can be varied and controlled easily with the patient moving their body. When a restricted area is found, the patient can apply extra pressure with the device to focus on a specific area of the spine. For more information visit https://spinalmobilitymaster.com.

#### James Salvatore, DC, **Instructor – Basic Sciences**



In June 2024, Dr. Iames Salvatore participated in leading a virtual presentation and served on a

panel for the Chiropractic Educators Research Forum, Technology in Education: Riding the wave of the Future.

The presentation was grouped into three, two-hour long sessions. The question and answer portion that followed highlighted the challenges and opportunities of incorporating technology into chiropractic education.

#### Jocelyn Faydenko, ND, DC, **Research Faculty**



In July 2024, Dr. Faydenko was a team presenter at the American Association of Naturopathic

Physicians (AANP)

convention, Architects of Wellness: Leading the Way to Whole Health. The event took place in Chicago.

She reported that participating in a learning opportunity for naturopathic physicians at the AANP National Convention was a fantastic experience, and she enjoyed collaborating with colleagues from other naturopathic institutions. The presentation shared relevant material about how naturopathic doctors can improve their evidenceinformed practice skills to better inform their clinical practice, and to provide the safest and most effective health care services.

In October 2024, Dr. Faydenko was spotlighted in the newsletter of the RAND Research Across Complementary and Integrative Health Institutions (REACH) Center. Through RAND, Dr. Faydenko is currently involved with several projects, and has received notification that a co-authored manuscript has been accepted for publication in the Journal of Occupational and Environmental Medicine (JOEM).

Included in her longer-range research agenda is a plan to assess family-based approaches to health, including physical activity and nutrition. She is also exploring a hydrotherapy project within the NUHS Whole Health Center-Lombard.






